Course Description:

This course will examine the main developments in the history of ideas and institutions from earliest times to the 17th century. It will examine the expansion of politics, philosophy, art, and literature of Western culture in addition to the origins of the major religions of the world; consideration of historical material serves as a point of departure for discussion of present-day problems.

Greek God/Goddess Assignment –

You must make a PowerPoint presentation to the class on one Greek God or Goddess that should be about 5 minutes in length and should include: who is your god/goddess, what is their story, why they are important, how they affect us today, modern depictions, etc. Your presentation must be accompanied by a 2-3 page paper about your god/goddess as well as a bibliography that you will turn in on the day of your presentation. A full rubric will be handed out at the beginning of the semester.

News Article Paper/Presentation:

There are many critical international issues happening in the world today that are directly related to the topics discussed in this course. For this assignment you must find a contemporary article or essay about a topic that pertains to our course (from a credible source – email me if you are unsure of a source). In addition to presenting your article to the class, you must also write a 3-4 page paper which will include a brief summary of the article and its relation to this course and course readings. A full rubric for the paper and presentation will be handed out at the beginning of the semester.
